2. Adoption of November Meeting Minutes: Dee 1st, Nikki 2nd

4. Administration Report – Keri/Karen

Spirit Wear - flowers for Dee for her hard work!!

- a. Delta Reads, Term 2
 - all elementary schools in Delta will participate, reading 8 selected books. Kids will have a chance to vote on their favourite book, only 1 book will be the Favourite of District 37!

- b. COI/Focus on Math
 - **COI Coordinator of Inquiry Program**
 - teachers work in groups to tackle a particular inquiry question
 - 2 different groups meeting on Tuesday afternoons
 - 1. Math Inquiry Group focuses on how to increase math skills and engagement using math games in classrooms, very dedicated teachers, exciting presentations
 - 2. Literacy Group how to increase skill and enjoyment of reading will be further explored at Next PAC Meeting March 1.
- c. Pro D Day Friday January 27th and District Literacy Day Feb 17.

Pro D Day Jan 27 - in school

- 1. Teachers asked to bring a favourite resource they think works well in the classroom
- subject/resource/grade groups share info on things that work in the classroom
- 2. Wellness Workshops put on by teachers incl. yoga, colouring, origami
- afternoon the COI groups might get together or other collaborations between teachers might occur

Feb 17th, District Wide Literacy Day for teachers at Delta Secondary in Ladner

- Almost every teacher in Delta expected to attend, enables District to advance literacy initiatives Deltawide
- -Educational Assistants will be going to Cougar Canyon Elementary and Seaquam for their own Pro D Day
 - d. Clubs: Reading, STEM, STEMastery, Rainbow, Pokémon
 - Pokémon Club on Fridays is by far the most popular club
 - e. Nathan Wilson (Indigenous Cultural Education) assembly Feb 1
 - 2 assemblies, primary and intermediate, about Honouring the Longhouse and Treaty
 - f. Maple Man Returns! for French Immersion Students Feb 21
 - Francophone from Quebec discusses Maple Syrup and French-Canadian Culture
 - g. Seaquam Band Performance Friday January 20th
 - big success, Sunshine Hills kids were a great audience
 - h. Canuck Place Cookie Day Wednesday January 25th
 - 50 cookies left! Out of 700 cookies sold 650 at \$4 ea.

- will offer the remaining cookies for sale Thursday
- i. Parking (new drop and go lane) experiment
 - school has received many emails from residents near the school about U-turns, double parking, parents parking in their driveways and general road congestion
 - Keri and Melanie proposed an experiment where the lane by the island where the daycare is becomes a "Kiss and Go" area for parents of older or more independent children to drop their kids off and quickly move on.
 - not intended for parents of younger children who wish to park and walk their kids to class

Questions

- Pritpal said he had spoken with Val Windsor about introducing coding classes concentrating on Aritifical Intelligence at Sunshine Hills and was waiting for a response from her
- Pritpal also mentioned lack of band teacher at Sunshine Hills, wondering about the hiring of non-certified teachers who are qualified but not certified

Keri: there is a teacher with a music background who has been acting as a band teacher since school resumed in January

- band teacher positions very difficult to fill, they are itinerant and may have to work at several schools at the same time
- hiring noncertified teachers are a union issue that the District is not interested in addressing yet
- suggestion for Pritpal to attend a Trustee Meeting to express his concerns as no further action is possible at the school level

Social Media Incident and Email that went out January 25th.

- Everything explained to best extent in email, further info withheld to protect privacy of students involved.
- Social Media group chat involving at least 20 students where "inappropriate choices" were made
- solved at the school level with the help of Delta Police
- discussion around privacy versus rumours and how parents can reassure their children without having all the details
- police did not feel there was an imminent threat, must trust their assessment
- kids should tell a trusted adult or teacher if they don't feel safe due to online communication or harassment or if they become aware of a threat against another student
- parents must also monitor young children's online activities and participation in group chats to help them make better choices

Discussion of Social Media Incident Continued...see above. Ultimately, there was a silver lining to this situation, which was great conversations with kids.

- 5. PAC Budget (Kim and Joseph absent). Numbers to be sent to Amika
- 6. Teacher Bursary Update Melanie
- Bursary applications came in with admin and all the applicants, were able to give money to every single application
- process: teachers apply through Gaming and General Accounts, this time for Science and Learning Commons
- Melanie reviewed applications 75% went to the field trips, 50% to consumables, which are things the kids take home. Parents pay the other 50%
- some funds went to the COI Focus on Math resources, and then a Social Studies e-textbook
- Field trips: 2 Aquarium, Space Centre, Seymour Watershed, Science World Funded at 75%
 - Grouse Mountain fieldtrip was over \$1000 so funded at 50%
- Science resources, STEM Club and a Plant Unit greenhouse which should last awhile and be accessible by other teachers
- re: Gaming Account, funded board games, kites, puzzles, novels/chess sets/rainbow club, book tournament/author visit, STEM for the library, library beautification, toobaloos and dominoes

Re: General Account, funded whiteboards

\$7,500 in total, \$2,100 through the school

7. DPAC-Nikki

DPAC meeting took place Jan 16th,

Mental Health Initiative Presentation, no copy yet, Nikki will forward

- Mental Health Impact of Covid 19 on Teachers, Students, Admin Staff, Parents
- Students feeling anxiety, depression, stress, loneliness
- Some statistics from a 2018 survey by McCreary:
- 2% of kids said they did not feel safe in school or at home
- goal is to reduce that number to 0%, silver lining is that more resources exist than ever before, Nikki will request list of resources
- 15% of Delta students have felt hungry in school what can we do about it? Apply for funds that are available to help with school lunch programs
- 28 Students overdosed in BC in 2018
- 90% felt they had a safe adult silver lining, only 10% felt that they did not have a safe adult to turn to
- Delta numbers are better than the provincial numbers, some recognition that districts and schools are also navigating the OD crisis and that OD deaths have skyrocketed over the last year
- having discussions about sex, mental health, drugs, and alcohol with kids and having support systems in place to help strongly encouraged.
- parents can discuss dark, dramatic Hollywood depictions of high school versus real life
- lots of school resources for students to consider: school admin, teachers, counsellors, youth & childcare workers, etc. There are 3 Health Authorities, Delta School District Direct Support Pyramid, Ministry of Child Welfare & Development, Delta Police Advocate Keepers
- in crisis, call 911.
- -- Jennifer's Update -
- Career drive for teachers K+
- 1st week of June is a Hiring Fair for Secondary Students, Career Ed talk will happen at the February DPAC meeting
- Vice Chair's Update most of the PACs in Delta have outdated bylaws and constitutions dating back to 2001 time to review and update as we may be audited
- new bylaws and constitutions must include Safety & Code of Ethics & Conduct

Melanie: re: Constitution, we did update SH Constitution as of 2018, 2020, but she will look into the Safety and Code of Ethics and Conduct

Q: What is the ethical standard for non-executive members? Ex. Meeting Etiquette for the general parent. How do we ask a disruptive or intoxicated parent to leave? Whose jurisdiction is it to ask a threatening parent to leave? Admin? Building?

Keri: School administrators can ask disruptive people to leave (In-person).

Nikki: On Zoom, "Remove Participant Option" -- she will double check with Jennifer from DPAC.

8. Spirit Wear- Dee

- Spirit Wear order was bigger than supplier anticipated, supplier ran out of dry blend fabric
- about 30 t shirts are 100% cotton, 3 types of yellow, distributed anyway but will be replaced in the next 2-3 weeks
- some items will be arriving within the next 2 weeks for kids missing items
- need more space and help for distributing items
- MARS online sales platform, alternative to Munchalunch which would eliminate the need to handle cash, better price point
- lots of colours in logo add cost, but makes for a more attractive garment
- parent have expressed Interested in another sales campaign in Spring
- could possibly coincide with Spring track order of t-shirts, shorts

9. Playground – Amika

- as per instructions last PAC meeting, Amika created a new Playground Committee gmail. Have had between 2-4 respondents, but have not contacted them because she did not know the history of the playground
- Tuesday Jan 24, met with Dawn Silver, a veteran of the previous Playground Committee, who outlined the ups and downs of a long, exhausting process that started in 2012
- funds raised for the front playground wound up being used to replace the back playground, which was considered in worse shape
- parents and kids were consulted and voted on the equipment for the back playground
- many families bought bricks to support the construction of a new front playground, which hasn't happened, these are legacy bricks which we hope to use, even though the kids may have moved on

- Parents and kids no longer involved in choosing playground equipment, only in fundraising playground equipment is chosen by the District
- Corporate Sponsorship or Taxable Donation route advised over traditional fundraising as over a 10 year period, we never raised more than \$125,000 for a playground now estimated to cost over \$450,000 to replace
- Currently have \$10,000 in the Playground Fund
- Next step: consult with Kim Kautzman to see what grant monies might be available
- SH is considered a high-income neighbourhood ineligible for the \$165,000 NDP grant we have all read about in the papers.
- -touch base with parents who expressed an interest in helping and see if one of them has experience in Corporate Sponsorship or
- setting up a way (GoFundMe Page?) for parents and/or community members to donate towards our playground in exchange for a Tax Refund.
